

Outcome

XYZ's defence sector raises awareness, develops and implements policies and standards on the cross cutting Human Security topics of Protection of Civilians (PoC), Children and Armed Conflict (CAAC), Cultural Property Protection (CPP), Human Trafficking (THB), and Conflict Related Sexual Violence (CRSV). Human security aspects are integrated into pre-deployment training.

Rationale

1. Human security is underpinned by the values on which the Alliance is founded – democracy, Individual liberty and the rule of law, and is a topic of increasing global importance to nations and to NATO.
2. The Human Security approach is people-centred. It considers a wide selection of conditions that threaten the survival, livelihood and dignity of people and their communities; in particular, those most at risk, women and children.
3. Being prevention-oriented, Human Security deals with the development of early warning mechanisms that help mitigate the impact of current and upcoming threats, and help prevent possible occurrence of future challenges. Human Security demonstrates essential responsibilities within each society, and as such, it remains crucial to ensure that affected people and their communities are able to articulate and respond adequately to their needs.
4. XYZ remains committed to Human Security, including by developing relevant national policies, doctrines, provisions and arrangements to ensure that Human Security issues are well embedded into the everyday activities of XYZ's military forces, including in the conduct of operations.
5. Human Security engagement capability, depending on local conditions, relies on adequately trained personnel that could be deployed into an area of operations for earning the trust and support of local men, women and families during military operations. Female engagement capability is especially relevant for interaction with local women and children, as a measure of earning trust.

Contribution to Strategic Objectives

Milestones

1. As part of the efforts to address the United Nations Council Resolution (UNSCR) 1894 on Protection of Civilians (in armed conflicts), XYZ:
 - a. Continues to include appropriate training and raise awareness in military and civilian career development and national pre-deployment education and training on relevant international humanitarian, humanitarian rights, and refugee law, as well as on the protection, special needs, and human rights of women and children in conflict situations.
 - b. Continues to provide expertise on the topic in the planning, execution and evaluation phases of operations, including those led by NATO. This includes the establishment of a "Competence Centre for the Protection of Civilians".
 - c. Continues to maintain a pool of specialists trained in the protection of civilians from which could be made available, upon request, for national or multinational, including NATO-led, operations, and training.

2. By the end of 20xx, a communication strategy is developed with the aim of enhancing public awareness at home and in areas of operation in conjunction with the competence centre mentioned in Para 1.b.
3. By the end of 20xx, develop and implement a [framework policy on Human Security] or [individual policies on Protection of Civilians, Children and Armed Conflict, Cultural Property Protection, Human Trafficking, and Conflict Related Sexual Violence].
4. By the end of 20xx, incorporate advice from Human Security experts with a view to subsequently provide expertise on the topics in the planning, execution and evaluation phases of operations, including those led by NATO.
5. By the end of 20xx, institutionalise mandatory pre-deployment training on Human Security for all forces participating in national or multinational, including NATO-led, operations and missions.
6. By the end of 20xx, institutionalise training on Human Security (or Human Security elements), for all defence and security personnel, including by incorporating appropriate curricula into career development, refresher and pre-deployment education and training.
7. By the end of 20xx, develop and maintain a pool of experts on Human Security and/or its individual components, which could be made available upon request for national or multinational, including NATO-led, operations and training.
8. By the end of 20xx, the Competence Centre for the Protection of Civilians transitions to a Competence Centre on Human Security.
